
The Unit

Some of the things your contribution has supported in Maseru over the past year



- Renovating, decorating and resourcing a property to house the boys
- Monthly rent for the property
- A safe and secure home for 3 boys, including all food, utilities, beds, bedding, toiletries, clothing and leisure
- A full-time house father to look after the boys, to counsel them and to show them love
- School uniform and/or books for six children so that they can go to school
- Transport so that the boys can go to church and to church related activities
- Setting up vegetable gardens for two families and for the boys' home
- Gardening tools
- Bibles for some of the children
- Food for twenty boys on the street twice a week (on average)
- Food for a term for three boys attending vocational college
- Medical provision for boys on street, including wound cleaning, antibiotics, treatment for burns and care for infected injuries
- Medical provision for a mother of one of the street boys
- Renovation of a door to secure a family home
- Regular food for three families of street boys
- Twenty laying chickens, feed and a cage
- Transport to visit boys' families and keep boys in touch with their families
- Mattress for the boys sleeping rough
- Balls and other social team building resources
- Socks for some street boys

Thanks to you, Christmas will be a little better for these boys this year.


